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Update on Species at Risk submissions and approvals

- Continued positive discussions with MECP, DFO and CWS.
 - Received MECP letter of approval for all non-fish SAR except bat hibernacula and caribou in September 2019.
 - Posting of bat hibernacula and caribou overall benefits permits to environmental registry site for 30 day comment period
 - Anticipate receiving MECP permit for bat hibernacula and caribou by December 1, 2019.
 - Anticipate receiving DFO letter of approval for fish between October and December 2019.
 - Consulting with CWS between October and December 2019; no permits anticipated.



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Another Other Business



BZA Update

- NextBridge has been engaging with BZA since 2014 on the project
- In February of 2019, BZA filed a judicial review against the government's decision to provide the East West Tie with an Order in Counsel and against the Ontario Energy Board for issuing NextBridge a Leave to Construct
- An affidavit has been filed by the Chief of BZA
 - NextBridge and the government will file evidence within a month
- BZA has been communicating to MNRF that they would like to see a halt to the issuing of permits for the project because they have assertions in Work Fronts 1 & 7

Indigenous	 Engagement team has re-launched the Indigenous Facilitator Program as of July 6th in a phased approach with two community facilitators in the field. The goal is to resume the program fully by early September. Formal contract negotiated and put in place with Supercom to manage program. Review of Atwell program support in light of changes to the program structure and lessons learned is being undertaken. Concluded 28.2 permits with Michipicoten First Nation and still negotiating with the Federal government for Pays Plat First Nation Working with Pic Mobert to implement the re-designed White Lake Narrows crossing option. The community is reviewing the mitigation agreement and ATR permit, provided the visualization study results in no major concerns raised. Two Trapper Compensation Releases have been signed with members of RRIB. Implementing the caribou relocation work with MFN. Relaunched discussions with the community on next steps with the Caribou Transfer Strategy. Working on a transfer requirements and monitoring approach with the community.




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COVID-19 UPDATE

Weekly COVID-19 calls are being held to review all risks. The provincial health guidelines are being closely monitored and changes will be made on site as required. The additional site safety measures below continue to be followed:

- Screening new workers and workers who have recently travelled;
- o Testing workers on site;
- o Reducing contact between employees, including how they travel to and from site each day;
- Modified accommodations;
- Additional cleaning and sanitizing procedures;
- o Providing additional PPE to employees including masks and hand sanitizer; and,
- o Supplying workers with a COVID-19 Response Brochure
- Total of 23 positive COVID-19 cases identified on the Project
- As of the start of March, 5 workers remained in isolation who presented symptoms or tested positive for COVID, or were identified through the contract tracing procedure
- The last remaining quarantined worker is expected to return to work approximately March 11th
- Following the temporary closure of the White River camp in early February, all project facilities have since re-opened and are presently in operation
- New workers and workers on turn-around continue to be tested and quarantined in Thunder Bay before being moved to their respective work camps
- As the winter season comes to a close, crews will remain on site as long as possible to complete work
 in winter restricted zones to reduce the chance of new cases being contracted during worker rotations
- Regional restrictions and COVID-19 guidelines continue to be monitored and implemented on site

NextBridge and Valard continue to work with all regional health departments to ensure the safety of workers and the general public

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Regulatory Matters

- Rate Case hearing took place on March 29-31, 2021
 - NextBridge filed the Argument in Chief on April 9, 2021
 - Intervenors and OEB staff who wish to file Final Arguments must do so by April 27, 2021
 - NextBridge will file the Reply Argument by May 11, 2021 and expect a Final Decision by July 2021
- Ontario Energy Board (OEB) Quarterly Construction Progress Report to be filed on April 22, 2021
 - This Report was mentioned during the Hearing and is expected to be reviewed closely by the OEB and the Intervenors
 - Information on construction progress and COVID-19 responses are included
 - Construction activities have slowed for the planned Spring Break-Up but are still on track for the March 31, 2022 in-service date
- NextBridge is recording costs related to COVID-19 in a separate account.

Indigenous Facilitator Program Update

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- Since October 2019, Indigenous Facilitators from seven communities have been observing and monitoring the construction phase of the Project
- As intensive construction activities have now been completed, Facilitators have transitioned to independently observing and monitoring community areas of interest or significance and active Facilitator monitoring will decrease
- NextBridge is committed to supporting ongoing Facilitator monitoring or site tours, as requested by Indigenous communities





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Regulatory Matters

- Rate Case Decision was received on June 17, 2021
 - Outcome was largely positive
 - Term was set at 5 years, 9 months
 - Costs for construction (\$737M), phase shift (\$5.3M), spares (\$1.2M), and capital expenditures were all deemed prudent and approved for recovery
 - COVID-19 cost prudency will be determined in a separate proceeding and costs are to be recorded separately
- Ontario Energy Board (OEB) Quarterly Construction Progress Report to be filed on July 22, 2021
 - Construction activities have resumed as workers returned from Spring Breakup in mid-May
 - Project still on track for the March 31, 2022, in-service date

Indigenous Facilitator Program Update

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- The Indigenous Facilitator Program ran at full capacity during the majority of 2Q 2021
 - One facilitator was absent from the field due to health issues
 - Alternative options were approved by the respective community to have other facilitators perform monitoring in the traditional territory
- The Indigenous Facilitator Independence Plan was fully implemented in 2Q
 2021 and included new reporting mechanisms and daily planning logs
- NextBridge continued discussions with the communities surrounding the flow of construction activities into summer of 2021 and impending decreased workload for some Indigenous Facilitators



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Regulatory Matters

- Ontario Energy Board (OEB) Quarterly Construction Progress Report to be filed on October 22, 2021
 - In letters dated August 4, 2021, and August 27, 2021, respectively, the OEB requested NextBridge to provide an update on potential schedule and cost impacts related to an Emergency Area Order (EAO), EAO 2021-13, and the subsequent Implementation Order (IO), IO-2021-NWR-02
 - These Orders were announced on July 14, 2021, due to extremely dry conditions in Northwestern Ontario and temporarily halted construction activities in workfronts (WFs) 1-6
 - Crews were re-mobilized to WFs 7-11 to maintain schedule
 - Restrictions in WFs 3-6 were lifted on August 11, 2021, and in WFs 1-2 on August 18, 2021, respectively
 - The additional costs incurred due to the work stoppage is estimated to be \$20MM, while the Project still on track for the March 31, 2022, inservice date

Indigenous Facilitator Program Update

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- Indigenous Facilitator Program (IFP) is fully active and monitoring is taking place, independently, seven days a week
 - Reclamation work and associated monitoring recommenced in WFs 1 and 2 in late August
- Discussions continue with communities in preparation for decreased construction activities and final reclamation work
- Increased focus on planning for transitioning the Facilitators out of the IFP, as reclamation is completed in communities' traditional territories, is beginning on the west side of the Project and will advance eastward

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Project Construction Progress Map


