-- Comments --
There are a couple issues I have with this application.

1. It states for fewer than 5000 customers. We have a population of 19,000 and, while that doesn't mean 19,000 customers, I find it hard to believe it is less than 5000 customers when businesses are taken into consideration, for our town to qualify for this pilot. Please supply numbers to confirm this is the case.

2. A flat \$5.79 per year to 'reduce a regulatory burden' is simply increasing the burden on the consumer instead of thoroughly analyzing where costs can be cut within. In other words, it's costing the town to make these changes so why don't we make the citizens of Tillsonburg pay for, yet another cost. That's really all you're doing.

We deal enough federally with a government, who simply wants to solve its problems by taking more money from the consumer to solve their poorly managed issues instead of remedying the problem properly. I don't want to see our town become a smaller version of that mismanaged, borderline-incompetent government. Our town is better than that.
